



How does this unit link to prior learning?

Component 2 builds directly on the knowledge developed earlier in the Level 1/2 Health and Social Care course by extending students' understanding of human needs into practical, service-based contexts. It enables learners to move from theoretical understanding of individual needs to a more applied appreciation of how health and social care services operate to meet those needs effectively in real-world situations.

What will you be learning about?

Over the coming weeks you will learn about the range of social care services which are available to support specific individuals and how these meet individual and personalised needs. You will also learn and understand the specific barriers which individuals face accessing them and how they may be overcome.

Individuals accessing health and social care services are often vulnerable, E.G. children or individual with physical disabilities.
